The Great Fire of London

The fire of London started in a bakery in Pudding Lane on 2nd September 1666. The city was very dry so the fire spread quickly. Lots of people had houses made from wood which burns easily and were built too close together. The fire burned for 4 days before the wind changed direction and the fire was finally under control. Only 6 people died.

Villain	Somebody who breaks the law or hurts others.
Gunpowder	A chemical that explodes if set alight.
Plot	A secret plan to do something.
Houses of Parliament	Buildings in London where the government works.
Catholic	A branch/type of Christianity.
Protestant	Members of the Protestant Church, a branch of Christianity.
Monarch	A king or queen e.g. King James I or Elizabeth I
Treason	Carrying out a crime against a country, monarch or government.
King James I	King of England from 1603-1625. He was a protestant and was unpopular.
Elizabeth I	Successful and popular Queen of England from 1533-1603.
Guy Fawkes (Guido Fawkes)	Fought for the rights of Catholics. Expert in Gunpowder. Found with fuses and matches on 5 th November 1605.
Thomas Catesby	Leader of the group plotting to blow up the Houses of Parliament. Executed for organising the Gunpowder plot.
Effigy	A model or sculpture of a person.

Elizabeth I dies. Her cousin becomes King James I of England.	Catesby starts planning the Gunpowder Plot.	Guy Fawkes is recruited as explosives expert.	A tunnel is dug towards Parliament. The Gunpowder is smuggled inside.	Lord Monteagle receives a letter of warning.	The King is shown the letter and The King's Men search the vaults.	Guy Fawkes is arrested and questioned. He is found guilty.
